

What is AB800?¹



AB800 is a law that will designate the week of April 28th, starting in 2024, as Workplace Readiness Week. This law stipulates that the month of May should be recognized as Labor History Month in all public schools across California. School districts are encouraged to commemorate the month by designing educational activities to teach students about the labor movement. There are also mandates around specific educational programming that should be integrated into school districts for the week that includes April 28th.

What is the goal of AB800?

AB800 aims to ensure high school students know their rights on the job and where to seek help if they face abuses. The goal is to empower young workers with resources and education so that they can enter the workforce with a strong understanding of their rights as workers.

What are the requirements of AB800?

- All public high schools, including charter schools must provide information to their students on their rights as workers
- Additional curriculum on the topics below must be integrated into the established curriculum of 11th and 12th graders
- Schools are encouraged to plan special events outside of school hours
- Starting August 2024, any minor who requests a work permit must be provided a document explaining their basic labor rights, with a QR code to access more information about resources

What topics must be covered as part of AB800?



- Prohibitions against misclassification of employees as independent contractors
- Child labor
- Wage and hour protections
- Worker safety
- Workers' Compensation
- Unemployment insurance
- Paid sick leave, paid family leave, state disability insurance, California Family Rights Act
- The right to organize a union in the workplace
- Prohibitions against retaliation by employers when workers exercise these or other rights guaranteed by law
- The labor movement's role in winning the above protections
- An introduction to apprenticeship programs

How can teachers receive more information about AB800?



Information regarding AB800 is still developing. Initial resources will be sent out to school districts starting August 2024. Every year, the superintendent will send a written notice with details about workplace readiness week, at least one month before the start of workplace readiness week, including how teachers can access educational resources.


